Healing Chromosomes by Hiromi Tango showcases a series of works that question our fragile and complex attachment to technology, and what this dependency may be doing to our mind, soul and relationships? A suite of new neon sculptural works will complete a series that will also include a large sculpture and photographic works.

Based on current epigenetic research around how our environment and activities can influence gene expression, Healing Chromosomes explores not only the impact of our unprecedented use of technology, but also what has been lost as human contact becomes increasingly displaced by electronic communication. Carefully constructed using colours from the healing palette, Healing Chromosomes take the form of the double helix structure. Its flowing lines create a new kind of script for the building blocks of our beings. These works seek to unravel this tangled web, and in the process to create new types of connections that consider what it is to be human.
